- First year students in Psychology 110 choose a service project where they work in the community, such as a local retirement home, day care center or in elementary schools.
- During January, students can select from travel courses such as the one to Hawaii to study multicultural psychology or to France or Jamaica to study the impact of culture on behaviors.

Psychology majors learn how to make the most of every opportunity. They develop skills to solve problems, mediate conflict, conduct research, analyze data, think creatively, listen carefully, write and speak effectively. Manchester offers research opportunities to undergraduates, unlike

most other schools where this professional experience comes only at the graduate level. Of the graduating psychology majors who apply for graduate programs, 86 percent are accepted. That compares to the national rate of less than 50 percent.
